Lesson 1 | 9/6 *Questions and Reviews:*

1.	Ask Christians over 50 that you know if they have experiences that illustrate the changes from Modern to Rationalist approaches to the Post-Modern approach.
2.	Who do you know who have been captured by the philosophies of the world?
3.	Why do human philosophies have larger influence over larger groups today?

- 4. How can we engage positive conversation with those under captive?
- 5. Can you see in yourself when you have been enticed, or enrapt, in pursuing human philosophy for meaning?

Lesson 2 | 9/13 Questions and Reviews:

1.	What are good working definitions of modernism? Rationalism? Creedalism? Denominationalism?
2.	Do the conclusions about truth from people 100 years ago matter at all? Is there any benefit for today in seeing how they reached their conclusions?
3.	What passages of New Testament Scripture that show that the writers did expect to be understood by what they wrote? And, that they expected what they wrote to be obeyed?
4.	What is the difference between expressing conviction about Bible teaching and binding that conviction on others?
5.	Why is expressing convictions easier than showing genuine mercy? Or, is showing mercy easier than expressing convictions?

Lesson 3 | 9/20 *Questions and Reviews:*

1.	What did Jesus condemn in the Pharisees? a. Matthew 23:2 b. Matthew 23:3 c. Matthew 23:5-7 d. Mark 7:5-7
2.	Why would 'Pharisaism' (the prideful emphasis on externals) be such a subtle danger to disciples?
3.	Why would denominational pride (or party spirit) be such a subtle danger to disciples?
4.	How important are words to the communication of the gospel, of the system of faith, of Christianity? a. How did God save the world (c.f. 1Corinthians 1:21)? b. What has called us to God (c.f. 2Thessalonians 2:13)? c. How has God provided and entrusted to us through the Apostles (c.f. Titus 1:3)? d. What is the sword of the Spirit (c.f. Ephesians 6:17)? e. From what does faith come (c.f. Romans 10:17)?
5.	What evidence did we discuss that shows the problems with postmodernism in religion?
6.	Why would Christians want to get away from the concept that God's authority is manifested in the words He has revealed? What abuses might have helped encouraged the departure from seeking words from God as authority?

7. Why is it so important to distinguish between those practices chosen for personal preference and those which are chosen as following the will of God? And where have you seen this happen in your life as a Christian?
